Psalm 23:2, “*He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.*”

This time of year vegetation is beginning to turn green on the earth. Many flowers are already blooming and many trees are already beginning to sprout leaves. We can see life returning as plants and trees begin to turn green.

Green in the Bible has always represented life and things going well. Consider just a few of the 41 verses in the Bible that mention “green.”

Genesis 1:30, “*And to every beast of the earth, and to every fowl of the air, and to every thing that creepeth upon the earth, wherein [there is] life, [I have given] every green herb for meat: and it was so.*” This is the first time we find the word “green” in the Bible. The LORD was telling us that every green herb that grows could be eaten. As the growing season nears, we’ll be planting gardens to feed us and crops to feed our livestock. We can do this because the LORD decreed that the green plants you grow and harvest can be used for food.

Psalm 23:2, “*He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.*” One of the most well known passages in the Bible is Psalm 23. It’s a passage of great comfort showing how the LORD leads us and takes care of us as a shepherd does his sheep. One of the places the LORD takes us is green pastures. The green pastures in this passage are places of rest where we lie down. Green pastures represent life, times of warmth, and a soft, comfortable place to rest. In the LORD we have all of these. We have life, the spiritual warmth of God’s love, and will have an eternal place of rest in Heaven. We will forever be able to lie down in “green pastures.”

Psalm 52:8, “*But I [am] like a green olive tree in the house of God: I trust in the mercy of God for ever and ever.*” The Psalmist was telling how being in the house of the LORD made him like a green olive tree. Olive trees in Biblical times were so vital to life. They provided food, oil for burning, cooking, and a healing balm. They would grow in the most unlikely places and could live as long as 2,000 years. The olive tree was vital to life and gave life to others. Olive trees represent the word of God in Zechariah 4 and Revelation 11. In this way the psalmist was like a green olive tree. He was full of life, thriving, and passing this life on to others.

Jeremiah 11:16, “*The LORD called thy name, A green olive tree, fair, [and] of goodly fruit.*” Following the thoughts above of how the people of God are like green olive trees, the LORD calls the name of His people, “a green olive tree.” We as the people of God are to be a green olive tree, flourishing, growing, and spreading spiritual life to others.

Mark 6:39, “*And he commanded them to make all sit down by companies upon the green grass.*” This passage reminds me of Psalm 23:2. Here Jesus literally had the people sit down in “green pastures.” He was not only nourishing them with spiritual teachings, but was feeding them with physical food as well.

They were literally sitting on green grass. This shows this particular area was full of life. They were receiving spiritual teachings from Jesus that would give them eternal life if obeyed.

The last two times “green” is mentioned in the Bible are in Revelation. The first time talks about destruction to green grass and the second is a commandment not to hurt any green thing.

Revelation 8:7, *“The first angel sounded, and there followed hail and fire mingled with blood, and they were cast upon the earth: and the third part of trees was burnt up, and all green grass was burnt up.”* Much persecution of God’s people is seen in Revelation. It seems the above verse shows how that the persecution was burning up all green grass. This of course is not literal. Like most of Revelation, it’s a figure of speech to show that sin will burn and destroy that which is green. It’s like a fire or plague spreading upon the green grass destroying whatever green growth there is. Sin does this to righteousness. Just as grass returns after a fire, there is hope in the last verse that mentions green.

Revelation 9:4, *“And it was commanded them that they should not hurt the grass of the earth, neither any green thing, neither any tree; but only those men which have not the seal of God in their foreheads.”* No matter what destruction comes upon the Earth due to sin, those who follow and obey the LORD cannot be hurt.

We will, but what is done to us has no lasting effect. They cannot hurt the green grass or trees. We have eternal life. The first time “green” is mentioned in the Bible, it is for physical life. The final time we see the green grass and trees, they represent the people of the LORD. We see those of the LORD cannot be hurt with any lasting hurt and also have eternal life.
