Mark 5:19, “*Howbeit Jesus suffered him not, but saith unto him, Go home to thy friends, and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee, and hath had compassion on thee.*”

The only time it’s recorded that Jesus told someone to “go home” is in the above verse. They stood, lifted up hands, bowed and worshipped, and wept.

These people no doubt were moved so much because it had been so long since they heard the word of God. With our hearing it often, if we are not careful, we can become cold and unmoved by the wonderful words contained within the Bible.

Have the words of the Bible become so common place that we hardly think about what is being read? Do we hurt when we read about how Jesus was treated in the events surrounding the crucifixion? Does a sense of calm and peace come over us when we read about the glories of Heaven awaiting the saved? Do the promises of eternal life make us feel better when our bodies are hurting so much?
