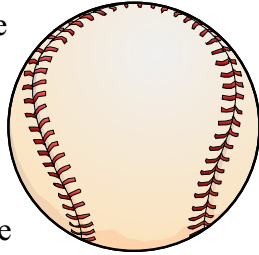

“Holy Bible”

On the front of your Bible or on the binding, you most likely will find the words, “Holy Bible.” The term “holy” is found in 544 verses of the King James Version and in 563 verses of the American Standard Version (1901). On the other end of the spectrum, the word “bible” is not used once in the Bible. What is the meaning of this term, “Holy Bible?”



The word “holy” stirs images of righteousness, and being close to God. The Greek word translated “holy” is (hagios). The word means, “set apart to God or by God.” It is applied to something that is set apart for a special purpose. (Note— Often, the Greek term is translated “saints” in the New Testament.)



The word “bible” is an anglicized Greek word in that the English word is similar in form and sound to the Greek word. The Greek word (biblos) simply means “book.”

Therefore, the term “Holy Bible” simply means a book that is set apart by God. It is a book with a special purpose. What better term to describe the book that contains the very words and directives of the Lord himself. It is the book of all books. It is the Holy Bible.
