

What Does TV Stand For?

Since seeing the same old violence over and over again gets boring, the violence has to get more graphic and bizarre just to keep our attention. Increasingly, the heroes of the stories are ruthless, powerful, characterless people who use violence as a means to an end. If we saw these types of things happen in real life, we would be shocked and outraged, but it's only TV.

2. TV stands for **teaching vulgarity**. It is commonplace today to hear on TV what years ago would have been considered outrageous and objectionable. The filthy language of the gutter is liberally strewn throughout many of today's shows. The humor of the shows has increasingly turned to vile and dirty punch lines. Rudeness and crudeness are the rule of the day. If our children talked like this, we would wash their mouths out with soap, but it's only TV.

- 3. TV stands for **teaching vanity**. Money, power, dirty comments and greed are the ingredients for a "good" show. Oftentimes the characters held up as successful, happy, and enviable are shallow, selfish, and self-centered. The emphasis is not placed on what kind of character you possess, but what possessions you possess. Are these the enduring values you want your children to share? It's only TV.
- 4. TV stands for **teaching values**. For years on TV fornication and adultery have been the norm rather than the exception. Situation ethics has served well situation comedies. Ideas are presented such as: "It's only wrong if you get caught." "Impure relationships are okay if you truly love one another." "Lying is okay if telling the truth would hurt." "Homosexuality is just an alternative lifestyle." Religion is mocked and religious people are depicted as oddballs and fanatics who just don't quite get it. If we knew that someone was teaching our children these things, we would be outraged. It's only TV.
- 5. TV stands for **time vacuum**. Whoever coined the phrase "couch potato" got it right. As we sit and vicariously watch what TV stands for, we are taking away time from talking with our family, reading, building friendships, participating in life, thinking, praying, Bible study, etc. We let our children watch for hours on end, and the same thing happens. They miss the opportunity to play, think, learn manners, and serve. It's only TV.

I know that not all of TV stands for the above, but much of it does. May we as Christians guard ourselves from what TV stands for and use our time with our families to teach them about God and for what He stands.
