James 1:21, "Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

James in the above verse tells us to lay apart, or set aside all filthiness and superfluity (overflowing) of naughtiness. Being human we are going to sin, but we need to set aside sin and keep it from overwhelming and covering us up.

Instead of letting sin cover us up and become a regular part of our lives, we need to receive the engrafted word. This phrase has to do with horticulture. It's possible to graft a branch onto a tree. At first, the new branch has to be supported by special tape or some means to keep it from falling off. The branch will begin to grow into the tree and with time they become one and the branch can easily support itself.

The Word of God is engrafted upon us. At first it's easy to lose what we learn and let the word and teachings "fall off" of us. We need

support just like that newly engrafted branch upon the tree. We need regular attendance, daily study, prayer, and engage in activities that keep us close to the LORD.

With time, the word grows more into us and becomes part of us and our very being just like the branch becomes part of the tree to which it is engrafted. The more time that passes, the stronger the word becomes in us.

A successfully engrafted limb after many years can be removed, but it's going to take a strong effort to remove it. The more the word of God grows into us the more it's going to take to dislodge the word. We will always need the support of others, daily study and prayer, etc., but this will only serve to strengthen the word and make it more and more a part of us with each passing day.

The end result of receiving the engrafted word is that it is able to save our souls. This is all that matters or all that ever will matter— the saving of our souls. The engrafted word can do this.
