James 4:14, "Whereas ye know not what [shall be] on the morrow. For what [is] your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away."

Tomorrow is July 1. Come midnight tonight we will begin the second half of the year. It's hard to believe that one half of 2019 is gone. Tomorrow we will be closer to 2020 than 2018. I hear many talking about how fast time is passing.

Paul wrote in Philippians 1:21, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." Just two verses later he wrote, "For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better." Paul truly wanted to go be with the LORD. It was far better for him to do so, but it was better for others if he were here. Verse 24 says, "Nevertheless to abide in the flesh [is] more needful for you."

The LORD does not want us to leave by our own hands. We are to stay here until we naturally leave, but we know that for those of us in the LORD, our state after this life is far better.

I know that I am well into the second half of my life. There is no way I can live as many years as I've already lived. But, that is not a sad thought. As I grow older, the thoughts of going on to be with the LORD and the saved grow more vivid and even exciting. We know that state will never end. In talking about the second coming of the LORD, Paul wrote in I Thessalonians 4:17, ". . .so shall we ever be with the Lord."

As of tomorrow, we are in the second half of 2019. Just as I know that tomorrow will begin the second half of 2019, I can help but wonder what day was the midway point of my life. It matters not. I know it's already passed and my last day here is rapidly approaching. But I know that will be a day to go and ever be with the LORD.

Jonah 1:10, "Then were the men exceedingly afraid, and said unto him, Why hast thou done this? For the men knew that he fled from the presence of the LORD, because he had told them."

In Jonah 1 we read how Jonah was trying to flee the LORD by hiring a ship. A tempest came upon them and two verses later Jonah said he knew this came upon them because of him.
