Exodus 13:17, *“And it came to pass, when Pharaoh had let the people go, that God led them not [through] the way of the land of the Philistines, although that [was] near; for God said, Lest peradventure the people repent when they see war, and they return to Egypt.”*

There are often shorter and quicker ways to get somewhere or to accomplish a task. It seems that most of the time, a shortcut just takes more time than it saves. We even have a saying, “Haste makes waste.” To cut corners often brings additional problems. Even electrical problems are often a “short” because of a “shortcut” across circuits that can easily destroy equipment.

As the children of Israel were leaving Egypt there was a way that was nearer for them to travel, but God did not lead them that way. There was war on the shorter way. God knew they would see the war, and be discouraged, and return to Egypt.

I know that we all sometimes might wonder why something is happening in our lives. We might even ask something like, “Why did the LORD let this happen to me.” There are things that if removed

from our lives that we feel would make life easier and even provide a “shortcut.”

We might be burdened with a serious illness or the tragic death of a loved one. Surely life would have been smoother, and had a “shorter way” if this was not part of our lives. It’s hard to see at the time, but such makes us better and stronger people.

Such burdens let us help others. If not for some sickness and tragedy we could never relate to and help others. We are told in Galatians 6:2, *“Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ.”*

It would be hard to talk to someone about the death of a child if we had not experienced it. How can you begin to relate to someone who has had a suicide in their family unless you have experienced it? An illness can help others know what to expect.

Some situations just make our life smoother even if we can’t see it at the time. So many feel life would be much better if they had more money. They feel that being “rich” would solve so many problems and provide a “shortcut.”

With much wealth comes it’s own problems that can be much worse than not having much. If your wealth is known, and it’s hard to hide, you will have thieves constantly trying to steal either in person or online scams. You will have constant calls for help, which are good to do, but it would become hard to determine which ones to help and which you would have to pass up, etc. Wealth can bring a “shortcut” but the way it leads can be even worse.

Even those things that seem to be a burden to us, can provide a better path. It might be hard to see at the time, but we need to remember the words of Romans 8:28, *“And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to [his] purpose.”*
