Job 4:8, "Even as I have seen, they that plow iniquity, and sow wickedness, reap the same."

We are over half way through May and summer type weather has farmers working the fields. Most crops have been planted or are about to be planted.

In Biblical times sowing was the same as it is today. Although they had more basic implements, they knew and understood the law of sowing and reaping. What you put into the ground is what you harvest later, and you will always harvest more than you planted.

Job said he had seen those who plow iniquity and sow wickedness reap the same. If we do sinful things, we will reap the results. We can also sow things that are not seen as overtly sinful. We can be slack in our attendance, put pleasure before the LORD, hold back on our giving, and we will reap the same.

I've heard people say that in their younger days they didn't attend much or serve the LORD, and now their children or grandchildren had no interest in serving the LORD. What we sow does come back

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in harvest, and the harvest is always more abundant.

People can also live sinful lives and suffer the results. It might be diminished health, loss of property, or any number of things. We will always reap what we sow, and it will always be more.

We do not expect the law of sowing and reaping of crops to be changed. We depend upon it to always produce what we sow and produce more. People often think this doesn't apply in spiritual matters.

Paul wrote in Galatians 6:7, "Be not deceived; God is not mocked : for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap."
