Jeremiah 6:16, “*Thus saith the LORD, Stand ye in the ways, and see, and ask for the old paths, where [is] the good way, and walk therein, and ye shall find rest for your souls. But they said, We will not walk [therein].*”

Most of us in this area have spent most of our lives on or around farms. With time it's easy to see the paths that cattle make from walking in the fields. They generally always follow the same path. Though there are no cattle on the farm here now, there are numerous cats that are just “wild” cats that have decided to make this home.

Over the years the population of cats has increased and decreased. There have been many colors and combinations of colors. One thing they all have in common, is that when they travel from the barn to the house, and vice versa, they follow the same path. They have been doing this for years and there is a path worn in the grass.

It's interesting to watch the cats not only just simply walk in the same path, but they put forth great effort to do so. I've seen a cat that has stopped and sat in the path. When the others come to that point, they either wait for the cat to move or simply jump over the first cat. They

The last sentence of Jeremiah 6:16 is sad and is the choice so many make regarding the old paths. The people to whom Jeremiah was speaking said they would not walk therein.

When one sees such a path, they need to turn from it and go back to the old paths. You don't have to leave home any longer to see these paths that lead to destruction. With mass media and the Internet, these paths are brought right into our homes.

We have an old path established years ago. This path is the good way that leads to the destination we so desire. This old path is the word of God. We need to make sure that we follow and stay on the old paths—the plain and simple teachings of God's word. Jeremiah said to stand and see. We have to look for this path, but he says it's the good way. We are then to walk therein and the end result is rest for our souls—eternal salvation in Heaven. —Marty Edwards❖

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Nehemiah 2:6, *“And the king said unto me, (the queen also sitting by him,) For how long shall thy journey be? and when wilt thou return? So it pleased the king to send me; and I set him a time.”*

Nehemiah had requested to return to Jerusalem to rebuild the walls. The king asked him how long his journey would be. No doubt Nehemiah didn’t know the exact time, but he probably could guess about how long it would take. (Nehemiah 6:15 lets us know that the walls took 52 days to rebuild, but there was much more to do as well as travel time involved.)

We might ask ourselves how long our journey will be— not a journey to another place, but our journey in this life. We know it can end any moment, but we know the longest the journey can be. Psalms 90:10 tells us, *“The days of our years [are] threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength [they be] fourscore years, yet [is] their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away.”* If we live full lives, we can expect 70 to 80 years. Some people have more, but at that age one knows the journey will soon be over.

For those in the LORD this is not a sad thought, but a very comforting one. Paul said in Philippians 1:23, *“For I am in a strait betwixt two, having a desire to depart, and to be with Christ; which is far better. Nevertheless to abide in the flesh [is] more needful for you.”* He wanted to stay and help others, but he knew it was far better to be with Christ.
