Proverbs 18:20, "A man's belly shall be satisfied with the fruit of his mouth; [and] with the increase of his lips shall he be filled."

The next verse, Proverbs 18:21, continues the thought of eating what we speak, "Death and life [are] in the power of the tongue: and they that love it shall eat the fruit thereof."

The produce of the tongue is so powerful it brings about death and life. I used to think this verse was saying how our words can lead others to death and life. The words of people are indeed powerful enough to do such. The words from a military commander can easily lead troops to life or death. Our words can lead someone closer to or turn them from the LORD, leading to spiritual life or death.

Psalm 11:1, "In the LORD put I my trust: how say ye to my soul, Flee [as] a bird to your mountain?"

We have all walked outside near birds and they all take off as a group. They flee and fly away quickly because we scare them and they are protecting themselves.
