Genesis 3:21, “*Unto Adam also and to his wife did the LORD God make coats of skins, and clothed them.*”

When man sinned it brought death into the world. Mankind was driven from the garden of Eden and lost access to the tree of life. With this, death started to come to all.

We see the first person to die was Able when he was killed by his brother Cain. After that, ever person who has lived has or will die. There were only two exceptions— Enoch and Elijah. They both did not have to die but were taken by the LORD. Even Jesus Himself died in order to give Himself for our sins.

Was Able the first death? He was the first human death, but consider that animals had to die to make the coats of skins for Adam and Eve. After that, the sacrifices made for sin required the lives of animals. Sin affects every life form. Even the animals.

The LORD placed mankind here with no death, pain, and suffering. Man was given a paradise, but it was taken away by sin. Not just for man, but for all life, including the animals.

Thankfully, the LORD provided a way whereby we might recapture eternal life and paradise. Jesus came as a perfect and sinless sacrifice and was offered for our sins. That permits those who obey and live for the LORD to once again have access to eternal life. That life is not here, but in Heaven.

Even the angels do not die, but Jesus lowered Himself to die in order to provide the perfect sacrifice for our sins. We are told in Hebrews 2:9, “*But we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels for the suffering of death, crowned with glory and honour; that he by the grace of God should taste death for every man.*”

Jesus arose on the third day following His death. In Luke 24 when the women and others went to the grave of Jesus to anoint His body, they were met by two men in shining garments. The two men asked the women a question that offers much comfort to us. They simply asked in Luke 24:5, “*Why seek ye the living among the dead?*”

Jesus was not among the dead. The next three verses say, “*He is not here, but is risen: remember how he spake unto you when he was yet in Galilee, <sup>7</sup>Saying, The Son of man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again. <sup>8</sup>And they remembered his words.*”

He was, and is, still living. Jesus said in Revelation 1:18, “*I [am] he that liveth, and was dead; and, behold, I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and of death.*” It’s interesting to use the term “dead” in past tense, but with Jesus, that is possible. He was dead, but no longer. He is alive “for evermore.” What a wonderful and comfortable thought.

Not only is Jesus alive forever more, but we too shall live forever with Him. We are told in I Thessalonians 4:16-17, “*<sup>16</sup>For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ*
