Isaiah 38:2, "Go, and say to Hezekiah, Thus saith the LORD, the God of David thy father, I have heard thy prayer, I have seen thy tears: behold, I will add unto thy days fifteen years."

In Isaiah 38 we are told that king Hezekiah was sick unto death. Hezekiah was told to set his house in order, that he was going to die. Hezekiah was distressed and cried until the LORD.

The LORD heard his prayer and said He would add fifteen years to his life. Hezekiah asked how he knew this would be and was asked if the shadow of the sundial should move forward or backwards. He said it was a light thing to move the shadow forward but move it backwards. The LORD had the sun's shadow move backwards to show Hezekiah that this would indeed come to pass.

No doubt fifteen years seemed like a good long extension to the life of Hezekiah. I'm sure these fifteen years passed much more

quickly than he had ever imagined they would.

Reading about this event in the life of Hezekiah makes me wonder if he would have been better off not having these fifteen years added to his life. During these extra fifteen years, Hezekiah had visitors come to him because he had been sick and recovered. Gifts were brought to him from the king of Babylon, who was named Merodachbaladan. (Ironically, in English the name of the king is 15 letters long, which is the number of years added to Hezekiah's life.)

When they came to see Hezekiah he showed them all the treasures of his house. We are told there was nothing in his house or dominion that he did not show them

Isaiah came and asked him about these visitors and what all they had seen. Hezekiah told him they had seen everything. Isaiah then told Hezekiah that everything in his house would be carried to Babylon. He was also told that his sons would be eunuchs in the house of the king of Babylon.

The LORD was obviously displeased with Hezekiah showing everything in his house. We are not told why, but there are reasons why the LORD would have been displeased. Showing all of one's goods can be a showing of pride. It's vaunting one's self up. Perhaps Hezekiah would have been much better off to thank the visitors and tell them of what the LORD had done for him, instead of showing the things he had.

There are great lessons we can learn from this account of Hezekiah. The LORD has blessed us abundantly. Let's give humble thanks for the things we have and use our abundance to the glory of the LORD and furthering His kingdom.
