People are not interested in sitcoms and movies. Even the barons of Wall Street have had little to no interest earning interest on their investments.

I receive many email newsletters regarding computers and software. Many of these were not published this past week as they normally are. Instead, a brief message of concern and condolences were sent in lieu of the regular information. Even many Internet sites that are not news sites, but are for shopping and commerce are decorated with flags and mention prayer and concern. This event has caused us all to become very focused on what really matters and what does not.

- 4. **People are capable of great good and unselfishness.** Yes, there are a lot of evil people in the world as is so pointedly shown, but look at the outpouring of love and support that has been demonstrated. At one point, the mayor of New York had to ask people to stop volunteering for a while. They were overwhelmed with offers.
- 5. **People come together.** As in all tragedies, much good has come and will continue to come from this event. Our nation seems to be united on a scale that most of us have never seen.
